Urgent Need for Action

- 800 million people are suffering hunger, more than one billion more are undernourished. → Huge obstacle to development.
- The number of people in Africa suffering hunger is growing, the number of people living in fragile situations who are affected by hunger is growing.
- In many places agricultural activity is placing a heavy burden on nature and on the environment, agricultural resources are under threat and the population is still growing.
- At the same time, in many places access to resources (esp. land and water) is insecure and unfair.





Aim of the "One World – No Hunger" Initiative

Overcoming hunger and malnutrition for people who are alive today

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Securing the conditions that will allow future generations of a growing population to feed themselves

- 4. Stability of 1.-3. over time






Six Field of Action of the "One World – No Hunger" Initiative

Fields of Action 1 & 2: Food Security and Nutrition, Resilience

- Tackling undernutrition, especially in mothers and young children
- Diversification of food supply
- Multi-sectoral approach
- Strengthening resilience to crises and conflicts, reducing hungry days





Fields of Action 3 & 4: Innovation, Rural Transformation

- Focus on smallholder agriculture
- Developing potential through improved access to markets and the possibility of producing more
- Promoting knowledge-based innovation as a driving force for progress in productivity
- Supporting socially and environmentally sound rural transformation





Why Innovation? Why a Green Revolution for Africa?


Innovation feeds the world:

Innovation accounts for 75% of global agricultural growth (Africa: 40%)






Increase in factor productivity in global agriculture (% p.a.)
